Coercive Control is a common feature of abusive relationships, one survivor describes it as like 'walking on eggshells'.





Definition

Coercive control is most often a purposeful pattern of assaults, threats, humiliation and intimidation which is used to harm, punish or frighten the victim.

recognised as an **offence** under the Serious Crime Act in England since 2015.

Fear that violence will be used against them on at least two occasions; Serious alarm or **distress** which has a substantial effect on their day-today activities.
