Foreword from **Bishop Jane**

This quarter's Prayer Diary is focused on "becoming". As Christ transforms us, we are becoming the people we were created to be.

What are you becoming? Somebody once told me a very helpful question she had been asked: "What sort of a 93-year-old would you like to be?" Our Diocesan Vision answers that question for us very well: we, when we are older than we are now, would like indeed to be Transformed by Christ, so that we are people of prayer, pastoral care and prophetic insight.

But how are we to co-operate with the Lord in this transformation? Prayer must be at the heart of our answer to that, prayer which listens as well as asks, prayer which is silent as well as spoken, prayer to which we give time and attention.

"Attention" is the key word here. We are changed by that to which we give attention. If we spend our time fuelling our anger, we become angry people. Spend time trying to smile and we get into the habit of it. Hundreds of years ago, Saint Augustine taught that the outer form of the sacrament was the way to its inner grace. We too need an outer form. Let us pray that it leads to God's invisible grace.

Of course, becoming is a matter of being and of doing. Perhaps our becoming will lead us to something new. As we turn from Prayer to Pastoral next quarter, may that discernment be clear to your heart as we are all transformed by our Lord.

"Retirement was looming, and I needed a project with purpose and a sense of mission," explains Irene Nicholson.

A flyer about *Open the Book* appeared at Hopton Primary school. This lively act of collective worship with a script and Bible stories, with quiet time for reflection and all-inclusive prayer is taken into school by groups of people from any local church. "That was 13 years ago!" reflects Irene. "Now two of us form the team together with the children who create the picture for the story and help to lead the worship.

"One light-bulb moment was when I monitored the worship as a foundation governor and asked a little boy what he thought about our telling of the story of The Good Shepherd. He said: 'I was the shepherd in that *Open the Book* story. It made me feel protected because Jesus will look after all of his sheep.' What a privilege!"

Visionary founders, inspiring staff

All are welcome at 3.30pm on 25 September at a special service in the Cathedral to mark the 250th anniversary of the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital. Who knows how many hundreds have served as hospital chaplains during that time?

One of the current chaplains is Canon Darren Thornton. When pandemic struck, the university chaplaincy where he ministered closed overnight, so he offered himself as a hospital bank chaplain instead and, having worked in mental health chaplaincy years before, felt immediately at home. When a fulltime post came up, he applied, encouraged by colleagues who saw with clarity that God was calling Darren to join them. He loves it, deeply fulfilled in the task of bringing hope to the bedsides of the sick and dying. "It's a privilege to bring something of God into desperate situations," he says. "And it's a great place to work – those doctors and nurses are miracle workers!"

Integrate Youth for Christ work in Thetford Academy

Steph's story started locally with voluntary work and developed to charity work, alongside a group of churches in primary schools and high schools in Norfolk. After hearing a Thetford vicar saying, "We can't have a generation passing us by on my watch without knowing Christ", a youth café was started.

Some four years later after praying and pushing on doors, Steph found the right person to talk to at the high school and doors opened. A weekly lunchtime club, More2Life, was formed at Thetford Academy. Students meet as they eat their lunch and hear about Jesus in sessions like 'Magic tricks or Miracles?'

What a start! Steph sees young people sometimes living a partial life, spending hours on screen, and struggling with mental health. Her prayer is that they come to know Jesus, have life, and have it to the full (John 10:10). www.integrateyfc.org.uk

The worst part was finding 40 dog poo bags in an hour, people stuff them down animal dens and in the reeds. It was exhausting, but I hope we saved a lot of wildlife that day."

Becoming aware

In 2016 Blessing Chishanu, having grown up in Zimbabwe and studied theology in Namibia, had a call to serve the church in Lowestoft. Coming to England required finding a place to belong and getting to grips with cultural differences in the church. Blessing has found the African philosophy of "ubuntu" and its relationship to our Christian witness helpful. "Ubuntu" is an ethic that gives high regard to the relationship between the collective and the individual. The individual exists in the context of the collective.

Blessing says, "I may not understand everyone's language nor have a palate for your foods, but I do know when I'm truly loved. As we journey together on the basis of a love hewn in Christ for the other, then the rest will naturally fall in place. Finding home for 'communities of difference' often has to do with finding communities where the Love of Christ is tangibly discerned."

Walking with those in grief

"I didn't feel called to work for TimeNorfolk," says Lindsey Nettleton, "It felt more of a timely push through an open door! A client I was supporting ended a wanted pregnancy due to medical reasons. It was heartbreaking. Being alongside her in her grief and intense isolation changed me. I referred her to TimeNorfolk and discovered the job vacancy. It wasn't a role I felt equipped for, and I didn't want it if it wasn't where God wanted me. But various confirmations from all angles led to me becoming Head of Counselling and Training.

Four years on and I love the role and all it brings. The staff team share a Christian faith which sustains us when alongside those grieving pregnancy loss or facing an unplanned pregnancy. I feel privileged to be part of an organization that cares for people in their darkest places and seeing hope grow in often unexpected ways.

All are called to hear the voice of creation

The Rt Revd Graham Usher Bishop of Norwich and lead bishop on environment



The care of creation is not an optional extra for a life of discipleship but an integral part to the choices we make as we walk with Jesus. It should, therefore, be infused in our penitence and praise, our prayer and preaching.

As followers of Christ from around the globe, we share a common call to care for creation. We are co-creatures, and part of all that God has made. Our wellbeing is interwoven with the wellbeing of the Earth. During this season of Creationtide and beyond we have an opportunity to take stock about how we safeguard our common home and all beings who share it.

Faced with the reality of brokenness, suffering and death, Christ's incarnation and resurrection becomes the hope for reconciling and healing the Earth.

This summer we experienced days of extreme heat and wildfires destroyed people's homes and creatures' habitats here in Norfolk. The prevalence of unnatural fires are one sign of the devastating effects that climate change has on the most vulnerable of our planet. Human greed and land misuse has lead to the disintegration of ecosystems, the destruction of habitats, and the loss of livelihoods and species at an alarming rate. Creation cries out as forests crackle and animals flee. People are forced to migrate due to the fires of injustice that we have caused.

Yet the fire that called to Moses as he tended the flock on Mount Horeb did not consume or destroy the bush. This was a flame of the Holy Spirit that revealed God's life-sustaining presence. This holy fire affirmed that God heard the cries of all who suffered and promised to be with us as we followed faithfully to deliverance from injustice. This symbol calls us to listen to the voice of creation, and faithfully respond through worship, repentance and action.

Moses was told to remove his sandals, for he was standing on holy ground in God's presence. Perhaps we need to remove the "sandals" of our unsustainable lifestyles that disconnect us from creation and our Creator, contemplate our connection to the holy ground where we live, and listen for the voice of creation.

In all of this, I hope that we can keep praying with a hope-filled realism, knowing with the Psalmist that, "The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims his handiwork. Day to day pours forth speech, and night to night declares knowledge... their voice is not heard; yet their voice goes out through all the Earth, and their words to the end of the world." (19: 1-4)

Choosing to weave creation care through our prayer and action helps us listen to the voice of God, as well as the voices of those made in God's image who are silenced. In prayer we lament the individuals, communities, species, and ecosystems who are lost, and those whose livelihoods are threatened by habitat loss and climate change. In prayer we centre the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor, as we strive to be people of good news for God's earth.

Give us hearts to listen for the good news of your promise to renew the face of the Earth. Enlighten us with the grace to follow the Way of Christ as we learn to walk lightly upon this holy ground. Fill us with the hope to quench the fires of injustice with the light of your healing love that sustains our common home.

Discerning the way forward

In 2018, Ashley Hobbs came to Norwich to explore God's call on her life. She lived in a city flat with three others who'd also responded to the invitation from this diocese to join the Ministry Experience Scheme. She'd initially assumed it was only for those explicitly exploring ordination but "God made it clear that this was one of the paths on my journey".

Three years later, she looks back on a rich, influential year which taught her many things. From living with others, Ash learnt about human complexity; being offered a taster of many forms of ministry gave her the confidence to think bigger about how "I might share God's good news"; the theological modules on offer quickened her eagerness to learn and deepened her faith. "Despite some difficult moments," she reflects, "the year opened my mind and helped me discern God's call to work with children and young people."

"Perhaps I shouldn't be surprised," reflects Elizabeth Hargest who was commissioned as an Authorised Worship Assistant (AWA) just last year, "because leading worship is in my DNA." Her father was a priest and her grandfather a bishop and she'd wondered in the past about licensed lay or even ordained ministry, but family commitments were always the stronger call. Newly aware of AWA ministry, however, the call came again. More strongly.

A youthful 79, full of energy and enthusiasm, Elizabeth now regularly leads weekday Morning Prayer (pictured) as well as Sunday Services of the Word across the North Walsham benefice. She is part of the Lay Chalice Assistant team, oversees a weekly hour of silent prayer and takes the reserved Sacrament to people in their homes. "That was such a humbling step," she says, "and part of what I love most about this role – making simple connections between God's Word and people's everyday lives."

Hospitality and home

"Jesus' invitation of relationship is based on a metaphor of hospitality," says Anna Lloyd, quoting Revelation 3:20: "Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person."

"I have always felt called to cultivate safe and loving spaces of hospitality. Growing up in vicarages, I loved seeing the impact sharing our home had on people. From a cup of tea, to offering individuals a place to stay for a season, joining in with God's heart for hospitality has been something which has become second nature. It is why we so enjoyed helping create spaces like The Sanctuary and The Mitre in Norwich, and why our recent decision to invite a displaced Ukrainian family to come and live with us, was an easy one. My prayer is that together we will know what it is 'to dwell in the house of the Lord forever' (Psalm 23)."

A space to wrestle and belong

By lunchtime on the day we meet, the Revd Jack Branford has already had his regular meeting with the Headmaster, taught a Year 10 RE lesson and visited the bereaved family with whom he's planning the funeral of a parent. He has been Chaplain at Gresham's School for two years and delights in the "incredible privilege" of the role. His own chaplain at Norwich School was "great when I was wrestling with life's big questions" and it was there that Jack came to faith. Since ordination, he's felt powerfully drawn to school chaplaincy himself.

It is now his turn to offer space for wrestling. But everyone also craves a sense of belonging and through his welcome, encouragement and pastoral care, Jack offers this too. "This is your Chapel," he tells the Gresham's community often. Sixty of its members – both students and staff – have been baptised and/or confirmed in the last 12 months.

A journey of 'becoming'
