
Prayer Diary

And so, we go to be pastoral at the afterschool homework club, at the youth club, at the Mothers' Union, at the debt advice drop in, at the appliance repair shop in the church hall, at the lunch club for those in need, collecting for the foodbank, with the family of a very ill child in hospital, at the tiny funeral of someone with no friends.

Jesus, the Good Shepherd invites us to, "Take my yoke upon you and learn from

me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls."

As we are transformed by Christ in this year focused on living pastorally, so we will learn new ways to reach with pastoral grace to those around us facing such challenging times. We can work together with others to tend and bless.

We hear that in this prayer attributed to St Augustine:

Watch dear Lord with those who wake, or watch, or weep today, and give your angels charge over those who sleep.
Tend your sick ones, O Lord Christ.
Rest your weary ones.
Bless your dying ones.
Soothe your suffering ones.
Pity your afflicted ones.
Shield your joyous ones, and all for your love's sake. Amen.

"Try Zoom!" her son-in law suggested as lockdown began. Fiona Newton, a priest in the Benefice of Stiffkey and Bale, was longing to reach those suddenly cut off from church and from each other. Initially a sharp learning curve, she's found Zoom rich with possibility whether for Advent/Lent groups or worship. Monthly Evensong, for example, still flourishes three years later, extremely important to its now global congregation, far-flung relatives having joined in and spread the word. In these Zoom boxes sit people from the US, Edinburgh, Warwickshire, Herts and Surrey, as well as Norfolk.



This dispersed congregation loves the warm individual greetings pre-service and the time to comment afterwards; the many voices used to deliver the worship; the way Fiona follows up any pastoral issues; the depth of sharing among them. "There's a lot of bubbling yeast in there and it's clear the Spirit is at work," says Fiona. "My job is simply to go on nurturing."

Rooted in faith

In churches and schools across the diocese a number of young people are confirmed each year. As they take this step, we want to encourage them to deepen their faith and develop helpful spiritual practices.

The Diocese of Norwich Children, Youth and Families Team and Norwich Cathedral Education team have been working together to plan a discipleship day that seeks to help young people continue their faith journey. Based on work by George Lings from the Church Army we focus on areas of a monastery and use the idea of seven sacred spaces to explore aspects of discipleship, such as using the idea of chapel to encourage attendance at church services, the cell to reflect on having times of personal prayer, or the hostry to reflect on hospitality and being part of a Christian community. Through discussion and providing resources we pray that young people will find joy in a life of discipleship.

It was the atmosphere she created in which each one of us, whatever our starting point, felt affirmed and encouraged."

Nurturing the whole person

WarmSpaces are sadly now commonplace and when All Saints' Mundesley set up theirs, the focus was initially on providing food and warmth with a free hot two-course meal, aimed particularly at families. It's developed into a multi-generational gathering where guests have set up a pop-up crochet class and a toy swap, and genuine friendships are growing between those who were previously strangers. The team of helpers, which includes a Bronze DofE participant, nurtures relationships and encourages activities using the skills which the guests bring.

"We're learning that we are not the 'providers' but are facilitators and are enriched by our guests' contributions," says the Revd Joanna Haywood. "We hope and pray that the space we offer will enable all who come to both give and receive, nurturing the whole person, feeding body, mind and soul! We're excited to see where this outworking of Jesus' love in action takes us."

Supporting the faith of children in the home can be challenging. The Revd Tony Heywood shares what he does with his family: -

"We've tried to live out our faith in front of them – if we see an amazing sight such as a beautiful bird, we'll suggest we thank God. If we hear of a worrying situation from them, we bring it to God in prayer. From the cot, we've tried to have a Bible and prayer space at bedtime. We've used a variety of different children's Bibles and read Christian biographies. I do breakfast with them and have tried a few different things including the Big Book of Questions and Devotional Dippers.



"Sometimes they are not that focused but on the whole, they want to know and will even point out: 'We haven't had our Bible time' – especially if it's late and we are looking for a speedy bedtime!"

Transformed by Christ for care and social justice

Last year, Bishop Graham asked Michael Newey, AWA in the Heart of Norfolk benefice and Chief Executive of Broadland Housing, to help bring clergy and laity together to help churches respond to the cost-of-living crisis. It seems obvious that we should assist those in need, but what does our theology have to say?

ake my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls, says Jesus (Matt 11.29). To learn from Jesus is to be a disciple of Jesus, who repeatedly responded to those who came to him in need. We serve others in imitation of our Lord.

Jesus inherited the great tradition of justice to the poor found in the Biblical books of the law and the prophets.

From earliest days, the Church drew on this tradition to encourage, first, care for those who lacked, and subsequently, social justice. In the fourth century, Gregory of Nyssa urged "Be generous on behalf of your unfortunate brethren" (First Homily on Good Works).

Augustine of Hippo insisted that "It is charity through which faith works" (Letter 189). Thomas Aquinas noted that "the further it departs from the common good, the more unjust will the government be" (On the Government of Rulers,

c1300, only partly by Thomas).

Some six centuries later, William Temple would argue that "Christian charity manifests itself in the temporal order as justice in relation to the equilibrium of power", asserting what he saw as the rightful claim of the Church's voice to be heard in social, political and economic life.

These theologies of social justice, on which in part the welfare state was founded, continue to offer a Christian imperative for acts of social mission and political action.

Such theology directs our attention firmly to the world in which we live and might, at first sight, seem a long way from our Christian expectation of the second coming and our hope of a "new heaven and a new earth" (Revelation 21.1).

In fact, the two sit well together. We know that the world in which we live now is not the world we would have. Hunger and poverty disfigure human society and diminish creation. We strive to eliminate this great disordering, this dis-ease of the world, by repentance and reformation of life, by our own acts of justice and compassion.

As we do so, we are caught up in the Christian trajectory from that which is to that which will be, even while we attend to the needs of this present world. We live as those who would allow the grace of God to work through us to bring the Kingdom now, even while we await its coming.

It is right for us to do so. For the Lord lived and died and rose again in this world to redeem this world. We serve his world as his disciples, imitating his gentle humility yet impelled by his transforming love and power.

Eco Church journey

"Starting the journey may seem daunting," says John Greenaway, Earlham parish's Eco Church co-ordinator, "but the secret is to take things step by step. We formed a small, diverse group of interested people which reports regularly to our PCC to ensure we're linked into the decision-making process of our churches.

"We registered with the A Rocha UK scheme and have started to work through the questionnaire – starting with some 'easy-wins' – it's easier to put up bird boxes than achieve solar panels in your first few months!" The group has also been encouraged by a visit to a nearby parish which has already achieved a bronze award and picked up some good tips from their experiences to date. "Each parish will have its own opportunities and drawbacks, but we can all move in the same direction and learn from each other," says John.

Encouraged to step out in prayer

"When I was asked to lead the prayers, I was horrified" says Eddie, member of St Helen's, Costessey. "Was I afraid of getting it wrong? Was I too comfortable with reduced responsibility? Hearing that it was to help more men be involved in prayer challenged me.

"When we pray, we expose our own relationship with the Father, and we are declaring this by the very action of public prayer. I grew in my relationship with Jesus by praying alone in my room, later praying with a small group and now I am stepping out to lead the congregation in prayer. I am also revealing my mindset and giving something of myself away and this is a challenge! However, it's not about showing how good I am, in fact it's not about me at all. Having someone experienced to spend time guiding and helping me structure the prayers has given me a firm foundation."

A royal anointing

On Saturday, King Charles III will be anointed. In the UK, anointing monarchs with oil probably began with King Edgar's coronation in 973. But much earlier than that, the Old Testament describes the royal anointing of Saul, David, Solomon and Jehu. So what might this ancient sacrament mean?

First, it indicates that King Charles is being set apart for a particular purpose and, like Jesus himself, whose very title "Messiah/Christ" means "anointed one", that he'll be set apart not to be served but to serve. As Archbishop Justin makes the sign of the cross in oil on the new king's hands, chest and head, the sacredness of this calling will be underlined. But in this intimate moment we find too a promise of divine nurture. As the Holy Spirit is invited, the soothing balm on his skin will also reassure him that, though human and fragile, he is not alone but held close by God for the task ahead.

Being part of something beautiful

How do you make the most of the opportunities around preparing for marriage, both in practical aspects and in exploring the self-giving and on-going love of the Lord Jesus Christ? Time to connect in a relaxed manner seems essential, time to model real, honest marriage, to walk and talk, and cook and sit down to eat together. This is the thinking behind the marriage preparation course at the church in Costessey, with congregation members Peter and Sandra Isaac, leading three out of the four meetings.

A handful of couples are due to be getting married this year, in the beautiful old church of St Edmunds, Costessey. Sandra and Peter have committed to meeting each couple separately, walking, talking and having lunch. Practical conversations such as the joys and difficulties of personality and expectations, naturally lead to the profound security of the love and forgiveness in the Lord Jesus.

Early on, Christmas and birthday gifts had been colourful books telling biblical stories – Noah, maybe, or the Good Samaritan. But then, talking often and in depth with her grieving 21-year-old goddaughter, Ruth was able to offer gifts of solace and support.
