

Should Noah trust in God?

Substantive Knowledge to test:

- Noah and the ark is a story Christians believe shows how God was not happy with people on earth.
- The story comes from the Bible, the special book for Christians.
- Noah had to trust God and believe in what he asked him to do.
- Noah's family had to trust and believe in Noah.
- God tested Noah's trust and belief.

Disciplinary Knowledge to test:

- ✓ Raise puzzling and interesting questions about religious and belief stories.
- ✓ Raise puzzling and interesting questions about the world around them.
- ✓ Talk about what concerns them about different ways in which people behave.
- ✓ Say what matters to them or is of value.
- ✓ Use their senses to investigate religion and belief.

Substantive Retrieval Questions:

- What is the Bible?
- What did God ask Noah to do?
- How did Noah's trust in God pay off?
- Why was God not happy with people on earth?
- What does the story tell us about good and bad?

Disciplinary Retrieval Questions:

- Was it hard or easy for Noah to listen to and trust God? Why do you think this?
- Why do you think Noah's family trusted him?
- Do you sometime find it hard to trust others? Why is that?

Retrieval Practice Assessment Approaches:

- The three-question approach – choose three questions to ask at the start of each RE lesson, one substantive knowledge about the current enquiry, one disciplinary question from the current enquiry and one random / bonus question of your choice for pupils to answer.
- At the end of the enquiry process in the EVALUATE stage provide a quiz for children to complete using the substantive knowledge questions.
- At the end of the enquiry process in the EXPRESS stage use the disciplinary questions to explore a deeper focus for assessing disciplinary knowledge – this could be used to form the basis of an assessment activity e.g. a debate of how moral laws support Muslims in the modern world vs leading them to be different and radical.
