<u>PART A</u>

ST. MARY THE VIRGIN CHURCH, HEMSBY

The village name, Hemsby, shows our Viking roots. There was a church in Hemsby when the "Domesday Book" was compiled and the present building dates from the early 14th century. The building is largely mediaeval in the decorated and perpendicular styles of architecture, the bosses on the roof and the font decorated with lions and symbols of the Evangelists are mediaeval. The 14th century square embattled tower contains a clock erected in 1870 and is decorated with flush work at the base and on the battlements. The two-storied south porch has a vaulted ceiling with carved stone bosses (depicting God the Father and the key scenes from the New Testament), which is incredibly rare for a village church.

The upper storey contains a "Parvise" or Priest's Room which would have been used by the monks from St. Benet's Abbey when visiting this church to take services. The room has been set apart as a small chapel for private prayer and is open to the public.

Inside the main body of the church, the interior is mostly 19th century. The lovely east window designed for the Parish by Caroline Swash dates from 1985, and perhaps the most unusual detail is found in the piscina – the drain is set within a lion's mask. The church has Grade II listing and has numerous specific and rare features, as listed above that should be preserved, celebrated, and maintained for future generations to witness and enjoy. The fact that the church building has survived for so many years demonstrates that many generations of the local population have cared and maintained the building. The recent church quinquennial report highlighted the problem with the tower roof and classified it as A B for attention.

Due to extremely pro-active fund raising, over 8 years, by our treasurer and members and friends of the parish the restoration work began in September 2023 and was completed on time in November 2023!

THE BARN ROOM opposite the church serves as a Church Hall. It includes: a disabled access toilet, an office with a large printer, and a kitchen as well as a hall which accommodates the groups that hire the hall.

The PCC manage & maintain the Barn Room for groups, individuals & organisations to hire, as well as care for and maintain the church building and support the incumbent.

We also host a Community Fridge run by Great Yarmouth Borough Council in the Barn Room, which will help those struggling with the increase in the cost of living and feeding children in school holidays. It will also help to eliminate food waste in the village.

PART B

OUR POPULATION

Hemsby is a coastal holiday destination for thousands of people every year in normal circumstances. The village population in 2011 was 3,275. The village has the sea on the east boundary and a rural setting to the south, west and north. The village has a primary school, a medical centre including a dentist, a Post Office, a selection of shops, pubs and enjoys a regular bus service to Great Yarmouth, the nearest town. East Flegg ward, which Hemsby falls within, is amongst the 20% most deprived neighbourhoods in the country.

PART C

OUR CHURCH ACTIVELY LINKS WITH THE COMMUNITY BY OFFERING:

A VERY KEEN PCC comprises the churchwarden, and 10 further members. The PCC has become much more active in 2023, and is determined to move forward and actively create better links with the wider community and local businesses.

The PCC understands that it needs to support the people who help in the church and beyond, and acknowledges that this will be something the new priest could help us with. By July 2023 all PCC members will have completed their DBS certificates and will be pushing ahead with their Safeguarding units.

The Churchwarden is the Parish Safeguarding Officer and the church is compliant with detailing safeguarding information on the church notice board.

The church has a PA and loop system.

CHURCH SERVICES ARE ANGLO CATHOLIC

Regular Sunday Eucharist at 11.00 led alternately by 2 retired priests
Fr. Patrick Kerley & Fr. Anthony Long
Regular 'Said Eucharist' every Wednesday at 10.00 led by one of 3 retired clergy on a rota system. Fr. Patrick Kerley, Fr. Anthony Long and Rev'd David Mills.
We have an array of robes and vestments for services.





HEALING SERVICE: In 2022 with the blessing of Bishop Norman the PCC instigated a monthly Healing Service as part of our normal services. This is held on the 4th Sunday of every month and is becoming increasingly popular. Fr. Patrick has had experience of leading a Healing service in his previous parishes and has been asked for a healing privately by different members of the congregation. The request to formalise this in a set service was brought up at a PCC meeting and the PCC voted unanimously for this to become a set service each month.

OUR WEEKLY SERVICES are enhanced by three house organists. We play for funerals, weddings

and baptisms as required.

We also have a dedicated verger for funerals which are led by one of our retired clergy. We have a team of Crucifers, Acolytes and Lectors for Sunday and special services.

PALM SUNDAY PROCESSION

ST, MARY'S SINGERS:

They are a larger group of singers and meet weekly in church or the Barn Room for rehearsals and sing at church festival services, as well as other events in the borough. Their concerts in church are very well supported and the singers themselves enjoy a feeling of wellbeing and health benefits that singing brings to them both physically and mentally, as well as a sense of achievement when they perform.

MARTHAM FOOD BANK use the church as a collection point for the local community. The church is a safe meeting place holding regular & festival services which help to combat isolation & loneliness as well as the mental health issues associated with isolation and loneliness.

THE CHURCH IS OPEN DAILY for private prayer and for visitors.

EVENTS & CONCERTS for all ages to enjoy in safety.

It is a place of great joy at baptisms & weddings.

A place of comfort & solace to the bereaved.

A place of friendship and fellowship at our services.

WE ACTIVELY FUND RAISE. Funds are currently going towards the drainage of the church which is very damp at the base and consequently making the interior walls damp.

THE MONTHLY 100 CLUB is run by a member of the PCC and actively encourages links between the local community and the church. The 100 club donated 2 new hoovers in July 2023, both paid via 'easyfunding' which donated a small percentage of costs to the church! Monthly winners are posted in the magazine.

VOLUNTEERS

'Volunteers are unpaid not because they are worthless but because they are priceless'.

We are very lucky that there is a team of local volunteers. Not all volunteers attend church but obviously understand the importance of the church in the community!

The Barn Room is looked after by two volunteers, one who **cleans**, and the other takes **bookings** and ensures everything is as it should be.

Regular bookings are held in the Barn Room free of charge for those organisations that help parishioners look after themselves e.g.: AA meet weekly.

Recent links with **The ministry of Justice** have ensured that our churchyard is kept in good order as have the hedges, trees and paths. January 2024 saw the re-decoration of the Barn Room. The link is weekly and has made a great difference to the 'feel' of the church and Church hall - it feels loved!
