Introduction

Church of England schools are committed to offering high quality collective worship. They are places that recognise and value collective worship as central to fostering a sense of community and to expressing the school's Christian vision. In practice this means that structure, planning, evaluation, participation, collaboration, and inspection of worship are all taken seriously by the school and by diocesan authorities.

This document has been produced to challenge, to guide and set expectations for Church school communities and diocesan authorities encouraging them to reflect on their practice and to ensure that collective worship remains the relevant and essential component of an education that enables all pupils to flourish and to 'live life in all its fullness' John 10:10.

In Church of England schools, collective worship is seen as more than a daily 'awe and wonder' moment. It is the unique heartbeat of the school and is offered as part of a wider opportunity for pupils and adults to encounter faith by engaging in conversations about God, both as individuals and together.

We want pupils to leave school with a rich experience and understanding of Christianity, and we are committed to offering them an encounter with Jesus Christ and with Christian faith and practice in a way that enhances their lives...Collective worship in schools, including prayer, reading and reflecting on the Bible, liturgy, sacrament and experience of the musical and other imaginative riches of Christianity, provide a vital opportunity for this.'

This form of encounter through worship should be truly welcoming, inclusive and exemplifying the



In the Lord's Prayer there is the line: 'Your kingdom come'. What do you think Jesus meant when he said 'kingdom'? What might a perfect kingdom look like?

Jesus taught his followers about God's kingdom being a place, or way of living, where God's love and values rule. So when Christians pray the line: 'Your kingdom come...' they remember Jesus' teaching. Christians try to live their lives remembering that, as members of God's kingdom, they should love God and love their.

Matthew 13:31-33

'Jesus put before them another parable:

"The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

Why do you think Jesus described God's kingdom in this way? He also said that God's kingdom is like a party, a treasure, and yeast in a lump of dough. I wonder why he used these pictures to help his followers understand what God's kingdom is like?

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Collective Worship resources Theme: Harvest



According to that fount of all knowledge - Wikipedia - Harvest is from the Anglo-Saxon word hærfest,
"Autumn". It then came to refer to the season for reaping and gathering grain and other grown
products. The full moon nearest the autumnal equinox is called the Harvest Moon. So in ancient
traditions Harvest Festivals were traditionally held on or near the Sunday of the Harvest Moon. This
moon is the full moon which falls in the month of September.

An early Harvest Festival used to be celebrated at the beginning of the Harvest season on 1 August and was called Lammas, meaning 'loaf Mass'. Farmers made loaves of bread from the fresh wheat crop. These were given to the local church as the Communion bread during a special service thanking God for the harvest.

The modern British tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" helped popularise his idea of harvest festival and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service. - Thank God for all his has provided. Giving to others is a reflection of the gratitude God's people have for what he has given them.
- > Thank God for the farmers, fishermen and food producers.
- How can we help those who don't have enough to eat?
- Where does our food come from?
- Link to <u>Creation</u> God gave humans the job of cultivating the land. Are we doing a good job with this? Are there places where crops can't be grown because of pollution, rubbish, houses, illegal logging etc.?

This Bible passage could be used to illustrate that God cares about what happens to his people and that he promises to bring peace. This is hard to understand sometimes when there is so much sadness, hurt and death. Remind the children that in the darkness, God is there, working to bring peace, comforting those who are hurting and grieving through those serving in the armed forces, red cross or other agencies.






Key Stage 2




What does the community need?

- It is important to hear the vision from different people and in different ways, so it becomes understood by everyone.

- In the initial phone call the inspector will ask you this question.
- You can direct them to your policy and information on your website or prospectus.
- You need to explain what you do, how you do it and why you do it?



IQ3 How is collective worship enabling pupils and adults to flourish spiritually?

- a) How do the theologically rooted Christian vision and the Anglican/Methodist foundation of the school shape worship and spirituality in the school?
- b) How do partnerships with the DBE and/or MAST, and partnerships with parish/local church/es enhance this?
- c) In what ways is the worship life of the school inclusive, invitational, and inspirational?
- d) In the context of the school as a Church school, what do pupils and adults understand to be the meaning of spirituality and spiritual development? How does this enhance and enrich collective worship and individuals' spiritual development?
- e) How does the trust contribute to and enhance the school's worship and spiritual life?

Enhancing the Inclusion of Pupils with Additional Needs within Collective Worship

Collective worship is the heartbeat of church school life – it provides a daily opportunity for pupils to reflect deeply and spiritually upon themselves, others, the world and – for many – God. Such worship is underpinned by three key principles – it is inspirational, invitational and inclusive. Regarding this latter principle, Church of England (2021, p.2) guidance states that '[i]n the church school pupils, their families and other adults can expect to encounter worship that is inclusive of, and fully accessible to, all'. In supporting schools in this important work, we are pleased to make available a suite of guidance documents to support the inclusion of pupils with additional needs within regular acts of collective worship in school and local parish church.






